Motion: JB moved and Sandy Nastram seconded to accept the secretary's report. Motion was carried.




2019 Treasurer's Report - John Page




John discussed the financial condition of the lake association including the income and expenses thru June 30, 2019.

Sale of books so far this year and expenses:

Aquatic Invasive Species Committee

- Good News! Aquatic Invasive Species remain stable in our lakes
- We continue to have just four species of AIS (Curly Leaf Pondweed, Chinese Mystery Snails, Purple Loosestrife and Rusty Crayfish)









Zebra mussels and Eurasian Milfoil are in neighboring lakes and probably our biggest threats



2019 - 2021 Grant:

Provides up to \$241,000 for AIS control and water quality studies



Important facts about our new grant:

- 1 of only 12 AIS control grant awarded by DNR
- Largest grant ever awarded to RCLA
- RCLA financial obligation is approximately \$60,000 over grant term



2019 AIS Actions:

- ☐ CLP Bed Mapping completed in June
- 28 water acres treated in May
- Shoreline property study
- Bass Lake Water Quality monitoring started and native plant study
- Ongoing monitoring of AIS through the summer
 - Zebra mussel plates
 - Raking weeds near boat landing and stream entrances
- Eradication of Purple Loosestrife
 - Beetle release


President's Direction for 2019/2020

Propose Change to our By-Laws:

Current:

Section 2 – Dues: Dues shall be \$10 per membership on a calendar year basis.

Proposed:

Section 2 – Dues: Dues shall be paid on a calendar year basis and the amount will be determined by the board with formal approval required by a majority vote of members present at any special or annual meeting.

Why the need for an increase?

- □ Grants
 - □ 3 grants vs 1 and all come with their own financial obligation
 - ☐ Structure of grants
 - Scope of grants
- → We need to be proactive in building up our financials to be prepared for something more serious (i.e. Eurasian milfoil, zebra mussels, etc)
- Don't expect as many grants or amount of funding of grants in future
- The responsibility of lake management falls squarely on the individual Lake Associations (WI DNR only advisory)

Questions & Answers

- 1. Q: What kind of reserve should we have?

 A: Dave Bloomer: It is hard to predict. However, we have 5 lakes to work through. If Milfoil is found, we need to react immediately.
- 2. Q: How many pieces of property are on the lakes and do we ask those who are not members to also help build funds? What % are members? A: The board needs to determine a target.
- 3. Q: Is there a comparison lake to consider?A: Yes, Beaver Dam Lake is comparable and they treat milfoil.
- **4.** Q: If there is a decontamination station, will bass fisherman be required to use it?
 - A: Yes, if one is present it must be used.
- Q: How many years have we been treating CLP?A: From 2012 to 2014 we treated 20 acres. Now, we can treat up to 50 acres.
- 6. Q: Can we somehow get rid of muskrats?A: Val will check with Chris Cold
